The spread of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and of ndependent Baptist Churches in the Rio Negro region of Brazil is one of the great miracles of God's

grace in modern missions. God has placed True and Diana Hawkins in an important strategic position. They helped to start and continue to work with several Bible Institutes that are training pastors and leaders. They are also diligent to provide assistance and guidance to numerous pastors, churches, and church plants spread out in one of the most remote locations on the planet. As you read True's account of one of the many victories they have witnessed, please continue to pray for True and Diana Hawkins.

Aparecida Island is located three hours by outboard above the town of Saint Gabriel of the Rapids on the Rio Negro. This is just over six hundred and fifty miles upriver from Manaus, the capital city of



Amazonas. This island has been occupied for many years by several families and was named for the lady saint "Aparecida," known in nglish as Our Lady of Appearance. The people on this island worshipped and served their idol faithfully for

decades, building a shrine and celebrating her special day with an annual "fiesta," and inviting people from far and near to their festivities.

This particular celebration became well-known and was anxiously awaited all year. People would come to this island in canoe caravans of four or more from the other villages on the Rio Negro and its tributaries. Traditionally, the first canoe always carries their community's idol with two youths waving flags in the bow; one white, symbolizing the Holy Spirit, and the other with the color and emblem of their own particular idol. The last canoe in line carries the fireworks and shoots them off as they leave their homeport and as they are arriving in the village where the fiesta is being held. The hosts decorate their community center with homemade and store bought decorations, slaughter the pigs they had been fattening up for the occasion, purchase lots of fireworks, and most of all, lay up many cases of cheap whiskey. This custom is common all over the Amazon Basin. Aparecida Island became known for its rowdy, boisterous, and many times violent weeklong celebrations and for all the confusion, immorality, and drunkenness associated with their Saint Day.

Andre, a believer from further upriver, moved his family to the island and began holding services in his home on the east side of the island. He began winning people one by one and asked the churches up and down the river to pray for a miracle to happen on the west side of Aparecida Island.

At first, the people on the west side resisted and rejected the message, and then resented those who failed to come to the fiesta and participate in the festivities. Some even persecuted those who refused to contribute.

God began to work through the simple preaching of the Word and a miracle happened: one by one the rest of the villagers were saved, and God changed their hearts and minds. They abandoned their sin and idolatry and cancelled their famous Saint's Day festival. The community center used for their drunken parties became their church building, because Andre's house became too small to hold the entire group of Christians. Today, they are a very united group of believers. Their dedication to the idol was transformed into godly zeal. Their financial contributions for the fiesta turned into tithes and offerings for a new auditorium on the highest and very best spot on the island, the place that before had been dedicated and separated for dancing and drinking. The



entire community takes two days a week to invest in their new building. The ladies mix cement, help make the concrete blocks, and prepare meals for the workers. The men do

currently finishing the building's structure.

Upon our visit in July, they asked us what to name their church. Since it is built on a huge piece of flat granite, it was easily decided "Baptist Church on the Rock." They hope to finish

the building by the end of the year. The plan is to invite all the communities who used to come to the pagan festivities to come hear the gospel that changed their lives and ways.

What to do with the idol? They took it from the shrine and discarded t, embarrassed that they had lived in darkness and been trapped by idolatry and sin for so long. Because of the miracle of salvation, in the place of the debauchery, sorrow, guilt, and shame, God's love, peace, joy, and hope reign on that strip of land.

There was talk of leveling the shrine and throwing the stones into the river. They decided to leave it standing as a testimony of what God had done to all those passing by their village. It is also a reminder to them of the God who bought them (I Corinthians 6:20) and of what He has done in and through them. They are examples of faith and of what God is still doing in the hearts of sinners (Ephesians 1:15-16). These men and women are a miracle brought about by missions. They are a direct result of your giving, praying, and sending out missionaries to share the glorious gospel of salvation.

As Alumni President I look forward to news and information concerning our alumni. It is exciting to see what God is doing around the world through our graduates. I would like to share the following letter with you from Bro. Thomas Jones a 1993 graduate.

What does it mean to serve the Lord? For my wife and me, serving the Lord has meant taking the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ to the precious souls of Guatemala. Our service in Guatemala has been a labor of love and a great privilege for the past twenty years. One who serves the Lord must live a life of surrender to God's will. Our life verse says it best, "And I will gladly spend and be spent for you..." II Cornithians 12:15. I accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as my Saviour on July 23, 1988, when two boys from Trinity Baptist Church came to my door soul winning. The Lord became very real in my life, and it was not long before He called me to preach. My preparation for serving the Lord began with the bus ministry at the church and my schooling at NBBS. The Lord blessed me with a wonderful wife who was ready to serve our Saviour in Guatemala and to make all the sacrifices of deputation, language school, and faith building to get us to the field.

In Jeremiah 1:5-7, God told the prophet Jeremiah, "Before I formed thee in the belly I knew thee; and before thou camest forth out of the womb I sanctified thee, and I ordained thee a



prophet unto the nations. Then said I, Ah, Lord God! behold, I cannot speak: for I am a child. But the Lord said unto me, Say not, I am a child: for thou shalt go to all that I shall send thee, and whatsoever I command thee thou shalt speak."

Through simple faith and obedience to God's Word, some 2,500 souls have come to Christ, three Independent Baptist Churches have been established with five missions out of those churches, and a local church Bible institute and the First Independent Bible Baptist Seminary in western Guatemala have been established. To God be the glory!

Many notable individuals have been saved over the years. As example, I think of Bro. Billy, saved at the age of 83, who dedicated his remaining years to be a witness with gospel tracts and invitations to his church. A 17-year old boy, who after receiving Christ as Saviour, gave to God by acts of kindness before the Lord took him to heaven. A young lady crippled from birth not only received Christ and eternal salvation but also was rescued from a life of physical neglect and abuse.

God has done great things and has allowed us to be more than just spectators, but instruments in His great plan of redemption to those to whom He has sent us in Guatemala.
